Introduction

Purpose of the committee

To engage community members and district personnel in a partnership to develop criteria and make recommendations for an equitable feeder pattern for all students transitioning from elementary (PK -5) to middle school (grades 6-8).

Review of July 7 meeting

Grade Configuration Phase 1 Committee – 2015-16

The Board of Education adopted these findings from the committee's work in June 2016:

- All sixth-graders belong in middle school
- Middle school should be three years at minimum

Brighter Choice and Urgent Need for Change

Brighter Choice Middle School for Boys and for Girls closed suddenly in March 2015, adding 275 middle school students to the district with only a few months' notice.

- The district rented and then purchased the Brighter Choice building, renaming it West Hill Middle School, to provide continuity and stability for the displaced charter students on a temporary basis
- The district then moved West Hill to the building that became Edmund J. O'Neal Middle School for Excellence at the start of the 2017-18 school year, with a temporary feeder pattern that included Arbor Hill, the former North Albany Academy, Schuyler and Sheridan Prep



Review of July 7 meeting

Grade Configuration Phase 2 Committee: 2016-17

Work on a permanent PK-8 solution moved forward.

- The Phase 2 Committee reviewed options for a fourth middle school, or a third larger middle school
- The committee also recommended an enrollment pattern that spreads higher-, medium- and lower-performing elementary schools across the middle schools.
- The feeder pattern should result in an equitable enrollment structure that is the least disruptive overall

Additional Study: 2017-2018

An updated 2018 demographic study showed that middle school enrollment would continue to grow, but not as much as had been anticipated in a 2015 study.

Based on that, the district began to focus on three middle schools serving grades 6-8. The board opted for a 650-seat North Albany middle school to go along with Hackett and Myers

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Key points to consider

- The Dual Language Program will continue to feed into Hackett due to programmatic alignment (advanced Spanish)
- Delaware Community School should be considered as a separate entity
- Magnet schools are considered home schools, in alignment with the previous enrollment committee's recommendations that elementary cohorts transition to middle school together
- Albany International Center students will transition to middle school in alignment with their home school based on their place of residence

Enrollment goal, phase-in planning

Goal:

> Three equitable middle schools with approximately 650 students each

Enrollment timeline:

- Implement new feeder patterns for the 2022-23 school year for sixth-grade only, adding a new sixth-grade cohort each year until the new feeder pattern is fully implemented for the 2024-25 school year
- All students in grades 6-7 for the upcoming school year remain in place throughout their time in middle school
