Option A: 4 Middle Schools w/ Arbor Hill as the Third Large School

School	Student Capacity
Hackett	650
Myers	650
Arbor Hill	650
North Albany	350
Total	2300

Renovations at Arbor Hill to convert to a MS.

Possible need to create centralized kitchen displaced from Arbor Hill.

Renovations at North Albany to convert to a MS.

ENL program displaced from North Albany may need 300-student building.

Additional costs of small MS at North Albany for staffing.

50 N. Lark Street goes from MS to elementary school.

Option B: 4 Middle Schools w/ 50 N. Lark as the Third Large School

Myers	675	
50 North Lark	525	
North Albany	350	
Total	2200	

(still 100 seats short)

Renovations at Arbor Hill to absorb North Albany elementary. Possible 680 students total.

Possible need to create centralized kitchen displaced from Arbor Hill.

Renovations at North Albany to convert to a MS.

ENL program displaced from North Albany may need 300-student building.

Option C - Phase-In Approach w/ 3 MSs Initially w/ Arbor Hill as the Third Large School

School	Student Capacity
Hackett	650
Myers	675
Arbor Hill TBD	700
Total	2025

(275 seats short after first phase)

Renovations at Arbor Hill to convert to a MS.

Possible need to create a centralized kitchen displaced from Arbor Hill.

This would delay the ability to bring more 6th grades from elementary to a 6-8 middle school settings.

50 N. Lark Street goes from a middle school to an elementary school.

Option D: 3 Middle Schools (status quo)

50 North Lark	525
Total	1850

(450 seats short)

No additional costs but does NOT address the program.
